Course Description:

In an era marked by profound and often deepening environmental, social, and economic crises, we are challenged to seek sustainable solutions to these issues. This course surveys, analyzes, evaluates, and applies ways in which various Christian thinkers and communities define these local and global crises and seek sustainable solutions. We will proceed by 1) exploring "sustainability" as a concept and goal, 2) learning how others have begun to raise and address concerns at the intersection of Christianity and sustainability, and 3) developing our own research questions in order to survey chosen participants about their present and future endeavors to pursue sustainability religiously and religion sustainably.

Course Objectives:

In this course students will:

- 1. Develop the procedural skills necessary to analyze, synthesize, and evaluate diverse educational materials critically and charitably
- 2. Survey definitions and models of sustainability, as well as organizations devoted to these concerns and outcomes
- 3. Encounter, recall, analyze, synthesize, and evaluate the history of Christian theoretical and practical responses to concerns in various areas of the triple bottom line of sustainability—ecological, social, and economic
- 4. Apply knowledge from the course through experiential learning, by developing research questions and surveying local Christian ministries about sustainability
- 5. Apply course materials to personal and professional knowledge, experiences, and goals

Come to class! Your presence and participation with help you and your peers succeed on exams and other assessments. Grade will be lowered by half a letter grade for every session missed beyond four, unless "make-up" arrangements are made. Multiple absences = grounds for removal. Contact instructor if a long-term absence is required.

Assessments:

- <u>Two in-class exams</u> covering the required readings and lecture materials; 9/6 and 10/21; multiple choice, T/F, matching, fill-in, short essay; 25% of final grade (=35+40 points)
- Two response papers based on the readings and lecture materials; due 9/20 and 10/28 on eLC; three to four pages in length (1,000 1,5000 [max] words, not including references, double-spaced, 12 pt., Times New Roman); several prompts/topics will be listed on eLC for each response paper; students must cite relevant class readings parenthetically or in footnotes (e.g., Chicago, MLA, APA formats); a grading rubric is available on eLC; "border-line" grades can only increase from students constructively utilizing optional readings, sources cited or suggested within readings, and/or outside texts approved by the instructor; 25% of final grade (= 35+40 pts.)
- One to three weekly reflection questions based on the readings; due on eLC every Friday by 8 AM; designed to guide reading, discussion, and research (so viewing questions early in the week may be very helpful); posted and submitted on eLC in designated assignment submission folders; response lengths will vary, but should always be (1) thorough/complete, (2) thoughtful, and (3) make specific references to the text (including citation where applicable); students are expected to bring to class print or electronic copies of responses to facilitate discussion/activities; please let Dr. Roberts know if/why responses every need to be submitted late; 5.0 point scale; one date may be missed without penalty; 25% of final grade (15 weeks•5 points = 75 points)
- Sustainability Survey Project; See final four weeks of course calendar below for various due dates; detailed instructions available in relevant content module on eLC; after researching sustainability surveys/questionnaires as a class, we will craft our own (10 point in-class participation grade) and distribute it to targeted participants who have volunteered their time; students will work with Dr. Roberts to choose and contact participants and then distribute and collect and submit survey and (transcribed) interview data (25 points); students will be assigned a participant (or participants) individually or in randomly-selected pairs (depending on class size); sustainability survey will aim to assess knowledge, prioritization, actions, and future desires and goals of participants concerning Christianity and sustainability (ecological, social, economic); students will then be assessed on class-wide and individual data collation, analysis, synthesis, and evaluation (40 points); 25% of final grade (=75 total points)

Grading: Points→Percentage→Grade→GPA

- <u>Points:</u> As per the "<u>Assessments</u>" section above, grades are based on a percentage of 300 possible points, 75 for each type of assessment: exams, response papers, reflection questions; Sustainability Survey Project
